Speaker helps build intellectual body armour to defend Israel

TORONTO - There are still so many facts to learn about Israel and the Jewish claim to it, that many are stuck on how to tackle statements such as those from Sheikh Taissir Dayut Tamimi – the chief Islamic judge of the Palestinian National Authority - who said, "the Temple Mount has always been Islamic." At a recent talk, Richard Bass presented the critical thinking man's session on Israel at Toronto's Aish HaTorah Village Shul. Bass, who has developed a book and 75-hour educational curriculum expounding on Jews' historical connection to Israel, challenged the full auditorium of attendees how they would best refute the assertions of those who wish to undermine Jewish history. Some intellectual tools he

introduced were categorized as personal observation, tangible facts, common knowledge, tradition, shared values, expert authority, reasoning and personal credibility. "Virtually all of these are fal-lible in some way," he said.

"But the combination makes evidence more solid." To prove the Jewish claims vis-a-vis Tamimi, he brought in a Talmudic description of the Temple, 1st century histo-

rian Flavius Josephus' works,

the Arch of Titus carvings of the Temple candelabra, and well-respected Islamic scholar Yusuf Ali's commentaries, among other proofs.

Bass leads the JED Institute, which, according to its web-site focuses on "Jewish education so that all Jewish students possess the knowledge and pride to informatively debate the truth about Israel."

Popularity of his talks is growing. In the past eight months he has spoken in Toronto, New York, New Jersey, San Diego, Boca Raton, and to students across Ontario. Last year, Bass gave a presentation to diplomats and NGO representatives in Basel, Switzerland, calling on their countries to recognize Israel's rights.

Modules from the curriculum are scheduled to be part



of the March of the Living's required pretrip education for teens in 2012.

The accredited Israel in World Relations curriculum was piloted to high school students in Toronto in 2010, and is returning, with a six-fold increase in enrolment.

One element of history that is "conspicuously absent," according to Bass, is the conference at San Remo, Italy, on April 25, 1920 signed by 51 countries and adopted by the League of nations, which "supersedes UN resolutions."

At San Remo, he said, as the victors of World War I retooled state borders, the Jews were legally promised land in Palestine that included the modern West Bank.

It is among many rejoinders, he said, to those who espouse President Barack Obama's speech to the UN in 2009 that his government will "continue to emphasize that America does not accept the legitimacy of continued Israeli settlements [beyond the Green Line]."



TV reporter earns B'nai B'rith Israel-Diaspora Journalism Award

JERUSALEM – Diaspora Jews and how they connect with Israel was the focus of a major journalism award and two citations recently by the B'nai B'rith World Center in Jerusalem.

Abramowitz received the award for her report American Jewry makes living kidney donations to Israeli patients, broadcast in July 2011.
